In the foreword to his seminal early book *Silence*, Cage acknowledges a debt to Dada, and Satie was one of his favorite composers. Cage also notes that "what was Dada in Duchamp's day is now just art," but on Cage's own authority the possibility that 4'33" was a Dada-inspired gesture, even if also more than that, cannot be entirely dismissed.

Cage was fascinated, and terrified, by the idea that humans can never truly experience silence. 4'33", which consists of precisely four minutes and 33 seconds of silence - in three movements - is a chance to listen to all the sounds that constantly surround us, that we never actively turn our ear to.
